American Legion, SAL Leadership Honor Their Past on Veterans Day

For Christopher Casey, his grandfather's military service is why he joined the Sons of The American Legion.

His grandfather, David Harvey, recently passed away, lending deeper emotions when Casey, a National Vice Commander of the SAL, joined other Legion Family leadership at the Vietnam Wall on Veterans Day.

"When we were laying the wreath, to hear 'Amazing Grace' on the bagpipers, kind of gets the hair standing up on your back," Casey said. "Certainly thinking about my grandfather, but just the impact of the almost 60,000 names. ...

"What would their lives have been like? What would they have been able to accomplish?"

Casey said it was "a huge honor" to represent the 400,000-plus members of the SAL for Tuesday's wreath-laying at the Wall.

"I've felt the weight of that out there," Casey said. "I remember standing at that wall when I was 15 years old for the first time and just stared into it. You can see your reflection in it, which it's kind of an eerie thing as a 15-year-old. But I understood the magnitude of all those names today. I understand the magnitude of representing all of those names, all of our members and what we were doing out there."

'A greater significance'

SAL National Commander Bill Clancy joined American Legion National Commander Dan Wilely and American Legion Auxiliary President Pam Ray in laying a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier on Tuesday at Arlington National Cemetery.

"The Washington Conference ceremony is very nice," Clancy said, referencing the annual wreath-laying the SAL does in conjunction with the legislative conference. "But today takes on a much greater significance. You have the President of the United States laying a wreath. You have a 21-gun salute of cannons in the background, along with 'Taps' being played. You have so many veterans from every branch of service, every state. It's really moving."

Clancy said the time was "a perfect time to reflect upon who we are and what we do and all the great things that the Sons of the American Legion does. I'm honored and I'm proud to be in a position this year honoring not only my own family, but serving all families and veterans across our country."

The Greatest Gift of All

On December 7th, 2025, I had the privilege to stand at the USS Arizona Memorial at Pearl Harbor ... standing there for all of us. A sacred part of my being there was praying the prayers and thoughts of children from Rondout Junior High School in Accord, NY and from Troop and Pack 211 of Scouting America. My wife and I are also praying for a way to take the prayers of these and many youth to cemeteries in Normandy in June of 2026.

These young people know of and want to honor this greatest of love poured out for all of us by those who died or fought at Pearl Harbor and other battles around the world. Meaning they want to honor the love poured out by YOU who now risk or have risked all in serving. You are part of their thoughts and prayers; you who survived also put your lives on the line. Your family members sacrificed too in unselfishly sharing you and waiting hopefully and prayerfully for your return.

Why do we read prayers at Pearl Harbor, or Normandy, or Gettysburg now? First, God is outside of time. God can hear those prayers as if it is December 7th, 1941, or June 6th, 1944, or July 1st to 3rd, 1863. So, when we pray for fallen loved ones and "Brothers or Sisters in Arms", God can choose to receive those prayers in the very moment they gave their "Last full measure of devotion" or in the moments you served. With time as no barrier to God, I believe that God may share our prayers with those gone from us, or those still with us, in the very moment they most needed to hear those prayers. All things are possible with God. God needs no time machine to share what happens today with people in their far-gone yesterday.

The more obvious reason we pray now is so that the well-earned, well-deserved honor of prayer to the men and women who served, and who now serve, never dies. The honor to you and to your family and all families of veterans and active-duty military members must never die.

As the holidays approach, know this deep in your hearts and minds - you are giving, or have given the greatest of gifts ... the greatest love there is.

We salute you and your families always. God bless You, God bless the United States of America.

Louisiana: Squadron elects new leader, focusing on growth, outreach

Service. Patriotism. Community. Those are the values that Reginald Love, a Hahnville High graduate and resident of Luling, will highlight as the new commander of the Sons of The American Legion Squadron 509 in Ama, LA.

“It means a great deal to me,” Love said. “It’s more than just a leadership position, it’s a chance to serve veterans, support our community and continue the legacy of those who came before us.”

Love, the son of a Navy veteran, said the group exists to honor parents and grandparents who served and to carry on the same

spirit of service in new ways. Eligibility in the program is open to all male descendants, including adopted sons and stepsons, of honorably discharged veterans or those who died in service.

“That means expanding our membership, building stronger partnerships with local schools and civic organizations and developing new programs that engage youth and families,” Love said. “We also plan to continue improving our facilities and increasing our visibility through community events and service projects that make a tangible difference in people’s lives.”

He also wants to encourage more youth and younger members to get involved so they, too, can carry on the traditions of service and community that the American Legion was built on.

“I believe the best way to do that is through action,” Love said. “Hosting more community events that bring people together and remind them what the Legion stands for.”

He said more family-friendly gatherings,

fundraisers and service projects can make a difference in the parish.

“Every time we open our doors for an event or help a neighbor in need, we put the post’s name out there in a positive way,” Love said.

He said the group is not only for veterans but for the entire community. “Our doors are open to anyone who wants to help make a difference, whether that’s volunteering, supporting local initiatives or simply attending one of our events,” he said.

Maryland: Post raises \$30k for veterans' suicide prevention programs

Long before The American Legion launched its Be the One veteran suicide prevention mission, Sons of The American Legion member Michael Watts was aware of the suicide epidemic within the community of those who've served in the nation's military.

Watts' stepson, U.S. Marine Lance Cpl. Patrick Adle, was getting ready for his second deployment to Iraq in 2004 when one of his friends and fellow Marines died by suicide. Adle himself was later killed during his deployment when his Humvee hit a land mine.

Watts and his wife would go on to become friends with Adle's fellow Marines, and two years later one of them, Adle's close friend, also took his own life.

So when Be the One was launched, Watts was all in – to the point of currently serving as the Detachment of Maryland's Be the One Committee chairman.

"When The American Legion came up with (Be the One), I felt compelled to jump into this because I've had 20+ years dealing with his friends who served," said Watt, a member of Overlea-Perry Hall Post 130. "I've seen trauma related to not just the suicide aspect of it, but just the mental stress and emotions that these veterans go through. My experience has been good from the standpoint of being able to help where I could, but also concerned about the fact they weren't getting the proper help these veterans need.

"One of the things I realized quickly is there are limited resources out there for veterans. At one point in time, when a veteran had mental health issues and they needed to speak to a professional ... they would call about an appointment, and it could be (up to a 90-day wait). I found that to be very concerning."

That's what motivated Watts and the rest of Post 130's American Legion Family to host a Be the One event earlier this fall that doubled as a fundraiser for two Maryland nonprofits that specifically address veteran suicide.

Around 350 people attended the event, along with 50-60 Legion Family volunteers, for a day that included three bands who volunteered their time, raffles and other games of chance, a gift basket auction, a bounce

slide and face painting, and food.

Local veteran resources were on hand, while the VA Maryland Health Care System had a table set up. Watts said the staff that attended were so impressed with the event that they had offered to come back to the post to work with veterans who don't want to travel to a VA facility.

At the end of the day, \$30,000 had been raised that will go to two state nonprofits:

- Patriot Point, the Military Bowl Foundation's 294-acre retreat that provides a free, safe, secure and tranquil outdoor recreational retreat facility for wounded, ill and injured active-duty servicemembers, veterans, their families and caregivers.
- Platoon 22, which focuses on the successful reintegration of servicemembers and their families by assembling critical resources, providing peer support and developing transitional programs.

"We decided what we would do is take this money and direct it toward these organizations that have professional trainers that are working with ... veterans who have suicide issues," Watts said. "That's why we raised the money and that's what we're going to continue to do: provide resources to these organizations so that they can help our veterans."

BE THE ONE Watts assembled a 50-person team to plan the event, which included securing sponsorships and soliciting state businesses and local individuals for both financial and

in-kind donations. One of the businesses contacted was Frito-Lay, which provided 2,500 bags of chips for the fundraiser, as well as a monetary donation.

"We started to realize we were touching people in the community. People in the community are totally in the dark about veteran suicide," Watts said. "As our guys went out and started to these businesses and individuals, these people would open

their hearts and their wallets up. They were saying, 'What can we do to help our veterans? We were not aware of this.' And every one of these organizations said, 'Please come back next year when you go to do this (again). We want to help in any way we can.'"

Watts stressed that the event involved all components of the post's Legion Family, both in financial support and volunteers for the event. This year's fundraiser was open only to veterans and military personnel and their families, but next year the general public will be invited.

Multiple media outlets have reported on the event and Be the One's mission. "People in our community have become more educated," Watts said. "People want to hear about it."

But this year's Be the One event is just one facet of the post's focus on veteran suicide prevention. In addition to bringing the Legion's Be the One training program to Post 82's Legion Family, Watts also has brought in suicide prevention staff from the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs and a psychiatrist from the U.S. Naval Academy to provide similar training.

And since the post began emphasizing Be the One, 12 veterans who were in crisis have been saved. Watts credit the placement of Be the One signage throughout the post and Be the One wallet cards that feature a Be the One logo and a QR code directing to betheone.org in the lounge area.

"What we started realizing is these business cards were disappearing," he said. "We bought like 500 of them, and within a few months we were down to a reorder. What we're finding is that people are picking these cards up and putting them in their pockets.

"My experience of dealing with people who are suicidal is they're not going to sit around and talk about it. But if you give them something that they can take home with them and can do the research on, then it kind of opens the door."

As detachment Be the One chairman, Watts said he wants to get every post in Maryland to follow Post 130's lead in promoting the program. "It's a challenge that's worth continuing," he said. "And the best thing The American Legion ever did was to start this program."

South Carolina: Raising Awareness and Funds through 5K

Guided by the efforts of the local SAL squadron, the Legion Family at Post 178 in Murrells Inlet, S.C., has run with an idea to raise money for local veterans' charities and awareness of what the Legion Family is all about.

Quite literally run with the idea, actually.

The third annual Sweat For A Vet 5K Run/Walk will take place June 6, 2026 at the post.

"We have been able to attract people that would never have stopped or entered our post, and have been able to educate them on the Sons of The American Legion and that the post is more than just a bunch of guys sitting around telling stories," said Squadron 178 Adjutant Jim Brewer.

The event "was formed while brainstorming at one of our (squadron) meetings because we wanted to be more involved with helping the veterans in our local community, but were only able to have one raffle per year."

While the event is put together by the SAL, the entire Legion Family gets involved, Brewer said. Post 178 allows use of the facility, Legionnaires and Auxiliary participate and volunteer, the Auxiliary donates snacks, and the Legion Riders help block off streets along the route.

In addition to the standard T-shirts, finisher's medal and swag bag given to 5K participants, information about the Legion Family is put into each swag bag to spread the word.

The first race in 2024 drew 91 participants, and in 2025 they drew 149. Over the two years, the event has raised \$12,500 for Blue Star Mothers, Veterans Welcome Home and Resource Center, East Carolina Housing Organization, Team Patriot-Samaritan's Purse, and the Psi Zeta Phi military sorority. This year's race will also raise funds for The American Legion Child Well-Being Foundation.

"We are confident that it will continue to grow this year," Brewer said.

Supporting Veteran Families

Many programs make up the National Children and Youth (C&Y) committee, including Victory Gardens, the C&Y Academy, Children’s Organ Transplant Association (COTA), and Children’s Miracle Network. Another such program is the Veterans and Children Foundation (VCF).

The Veterans and Children Foundation (VCF), formerly known as The American Legion Endowment Fund, provides temporary financial assistance to military and veteran parents facing unexpected financial hardships threatening the stability of their homes. Additionally, VCF funds training for The American Legion’s accredited Veteran Service Officers (VSO) who are working over 750,000 benefits claims for disabled veterans and their families – free of charge.

Recipients can receive a one-time Temporary Financial Assistance (TFA) grant (up to \$2500), which can be used to cover food, housing, utilities, and other basic needs. To be eligible for the grant, a minor child of a

qualifying veteran must not be 17, or 20 if still enrolled in high school or is physically handicapped. The minor child must be the biological child, stepchild, or in the legal custody of a qualifying veteran. In order to apply, contact your local Post or Department Headquarters. The application must originate at the local level, who will investigate the claim.

Last year, the Sons of The American Legion raised \$85,223 for VCF. This year, we would like to increase this amount by 10%. How can you help us reach this goal? First, be sure to complete and submit the Consolidated Squadron Report (CSR). Blocks 11 and 12, under Children & Youth document the donations and hours towards VCF. Secondly, participate in The American Legion Family USA250 Challenge. Thirdly, consider being a part of the 1919 Society. Lastly, be sure to complete and submit the CSR, documenting your donations and hours you’ve spent on the USA250 Challenge and other activities.

The USA250 Challenge honors the nation’s 250th birthday by committing to physical activity, supporting mental health, and serv-

ing communities. Participation can be done as an individual or part of a team, such as a Post, Unit, Squadron, or Chapter. Ways to participate include completing 250 miles or hours of fitness activity, 250 hours of wellness activities, or 250 hours of community service. More information can be found on the USA250 Challenge website.

The 1919 Society is a network of donors who believe in The American Legion’s commitment to veterans, military service, young people, responsible citizenship, and patriotic values. Individuals or groups donating \$1000 or more are made members of the 1919 society and receive a lapel pin. There are different tiers of support, each with its perks and benefits. Those donating \$2500 or more are listed on a “Wall of Honor,” located at National Headquarters and recognized at national conventions. Those donating \$5000 or more gain access to the 1919 Society suite during the national conventions. Donations do not need to be in one lump sum; contributions can be made annually, quarterly, or monthly. More information and the pledge form can be found on the [VCF Website](#).





North Carolina: Flag Replacement Program makes Impact



In a quiet but powerful show of patriotism, Squadron 71 (Clayton, NC) has launched a unique flag replacement program that is making a big impact across Johnston County. Based out of Clayton American Legion Post 71, the initiative is dedicated to ensuring that the American flag is displayed with the dignity it deserves—fresh, clean, and properly maintained.

At the heart of this program is an antique postal mailbox, located at Post 71, where community members can drop off worn or damaged American flags for retirement. The mailbox itself is a tribute to civic service, built by local Boy Scout PJ Papineau as part of his Eagle Scout project.

SAL members collect the deposited flags weekly and store them until they can be honorably destroyed. But not all the flags make it to the burn pile. The inspiration for the replacement program came when volunteers noticed that many of the flags being dropped off were still in great condition—some nearly new.

Rather than destroy perfectly usable flags, the SAL began a recycling effort with a personal touch. When members notice a home flying a tattered or faded flag, they reach out to the homeowner to offer a free replacement—no questions asked. With permission, the old flag is respectfully removed, and a newer one takes its place.

After roughly six months of collecting flags, Post 71 teams up with local Boy Scout troops—Troop 24 and Troop 124—to conduct a ceremonial flag retirement. During the most recent ceremony, over 500 flags were burned, creating such a large plume of smoke that a passing motorist called 911. Fortunately, the Post had already coordinated with the local fire department, and the event proceeded as planned.

The program currently serves Clayton, Archer’s Lodge, Flowers Plantation, Four Oaks, and Cleveland. Last year alone, the SAL replaced over 200 flags, and they’re eager to continue that tradition with the help of local residents.


